Rules of the Rendy

1. All out-of-state goats must have health certificates. State law requires that all goats brought in from other states must have a recent, veterinarian-issued health certificate and be individually identified by either a scrapes tag, or tattoos and/or microchip with registration papers.

2. Keep your goats tethered, corralled, or leashed in camp. Please be courteous to others by keeping your goats controlled at all times. If your goats accompany you around camp or to get water, please keep them leashed. Do not let your goats sniff noses or butt heads with other people's goats!

3. Goat water. Rabbit Creek runs about 250 yards from the camping area. Bring potable water or a filter for yourself.

4. Use only certified weed-free hay. This is a Forest Service/ BLM rule for all pack stock. Please obey it.

5. Protect the trees. Goats love to strip trees, so please tether or pen your goats where they can't destroy them.

6. Ask permission before you pet. Some people do not want you touching their goats, and some goats don't like strangers. We also don't want to spread germs. Baby goats are especially susceptible to getting sick from bacteria that older goats are resistant to, so do not touch them without the owner's permission. Please use hand sanitizer before and after handling kids. Let's keep the little guys healthy!

7. Control your dogs. Do NOT let your dog wander or allow it to approach other people's goats. Keep dogs on a *maximum* 6-foot leash when near goats or people. Always pick up after your dog.

8. Use the porta-potties. NAPgA has rented 4 porta-potties. Do NOT use the permanent vault toilet. Leave it for the folks who aren't part of our Rendy.

9. Supervise your children. We love to see kids run and play, but please do not allow them to disrupt talks or disturb other campers. In particular, the porta-potties are not toys! Playing in the bathrooms is unsanitary and makes it difficult for others to use the toilets for their intended purpose.

10. This is bear country. Store your trash and food every evening in your vehicle or in a bear bag hung 10 feet off the ground. Keep pepper spray handy when walking through camp at night. If your goats are tethered, we encourage you to use bells so you can hear them startle.

11. "Leave No Trace." Please pick up everything around your camp before leaving, including old hay and bedding. Pack it in, pack it out!

12. There will be no animals sold in the store or auction. If you wish to sell a goat, you may do so privately. If you wish to donate the proceeds from a sale to NAPgA, you are welcome to do so, but NAPgA will not sell the animal for you. We may provide a bulletin board where members can post animals for sale, but you must bring your own advertisement and conduct all transactions privately.
