NAPgA holds a Rendezvous each year in a different location. We enjoy three days of classes, hikes, service projects and camaraderie!


NAPgA's mission is to:

PACKGOATS ARE ECOLOGICALLY FRIENDLY

- Their hooves are similar to deer. There is very little impact on the soil and vegetation
- Their droppings resemble native species such as deer and rabbits
- Their rumen destroys most weed seeds so they are less of a vector for spreading noxious weeds than other pack species
- They do not tend to overgraze but prefer to browse here and there, taking only a little of each plant
- They are more water efficient so have less impact than larger animals
- Goat manure is virtually odorless
- Packgoats perfect for wherever your adventures lead you!

The goat is an intelligent and interesting animal that is quick to learn, likes attention, is relatively small, does not require a great deal of space, and is fun to raise.

PACKGOATS ARE UNIQUE

- They are smaller than other pack animals so are easier to transport
- They are easier to care for and manage than larger pack animals
- Their equipment is less expensive than other pack animals
- They are small enough for anyone to handle - children, the elderly and those with disabilities
- They can hike anywhere people can hike, including boulder fields and deadfall
- They eat like a deer. They forage and browse a variety of foods so are able to browse for their own food on the trail.
- They are affectionate, playful and extremely intelligent.. Goats will keep you entertained at home and on the trail.
