The Rendy is the perfect place to meet up with other packgoat enthusiasts. Bring your goats or just camp with friends.

This year the Rendy will be located in northern Utah. The site is off I-80 Exit 39 in Wyoming. It is roughly 34 miles from the exit to the campsite in northern Utah. The road is half paved and half well-maintained dirt. Cars can get there easily. The nearest and last town to get gas is Mountain View, WY.

Coordinates: 40 58'38.7"N 110 18'18.27"W

The site itself is up in the mountains at about 7900'. Expect nights to be cold, and the days fairly cool. The camping location is a fairly flat area with trees to the north of the site where there are good places for tents or small camper/trailer units. Larger units can camp outside of the trees. There are a lot of lakes to cast a line in.

There is plenty of water from Henry's Fork River within 100 yards of the site, but no potable water for drinking and food prep on site.

Weed free hay is required.

If you can, please bring a table to set the potluck food on. There's always a huge feast!

Driving Directions

From either East or West on I-80 in Wyoming

Take EXIT 39 CARTER / MIN VIEW; turn onto 414 to Mountain View; go about 6 miles.

Turn RIGHT onto Wyoming 410 to ROBERTSON; go about 7 miles.

Turn LEFT off the paved road onto county road 283 toward WASATCH NATIONAL FOREST (paved road goes right, Wasatch Natl Forest goes left, can't see county sign until into turn.) go about 12 miles.

Turn LEFT toward HENRY'S FORK; go about 7 miles.

Turn LEFT toward LONETREE, go about 2 miles

Turn LEFT onto SERVICE ROAD FORK A NO 7, in about .5 mile you run into a well house.

Turn LEFT onto unmaintained road and arrive at campsite. Only .2 mile of this.

Look for the signs, it is well marked until the last turn. We will add signs at bad corners. Lots of well roads in area.

She is passionate about packgoats and has introduced packgoats to her friends. Her father, Matt, brought home horned packgoats in 2010 and thus began her time






Alexis plans to become a large animal veterinarian. We hope Alexis will work on goats, too!

Volunteering for Trail Projects with Pack Goats

Carl and I are always looking for creative ways to use our pack goats to help others. In July of 2022, we "volunteered" (aka volun-TOLD) our goats to help complete a trail project on the Payette National Forest, with the Idaho Trails Association near McCall, Idaho. Our 4 goats carried gear and supplies to a work/camp site, where we spent the night and hiked back out the next day.




Prior to meeting the 6-person crew, we informed each individual that we would be able to lighten their personal backpack load by approximately 10 pounds, which had to fit into a space "the size of a football". This amount and size was determined by the "rule of thumb" of what we knew our goats were capable of car-

rying, and the capacity of their goat packs, (which also had to include our own personal camping

gear). We brought our scale to the trailhead, where we met the crew, weighed each member's parcel (these mostly consisted of crew-member's food) and distributed the total amount between our 4 goats. In order to avoid any conflict between our goats and crew members, we got a head

start on the hike in, and met






Everyone on the crew seemed to enjoy the experience of hiking with pack goats, as well as seeing their capabilities. Although lightening a backpack load by 10 lbs each may not seem like much, every ounce can make a big difference, as anyone that has carried a full

backpack up a steep hill can attest. In this case, the crew had to carry additional weight of

hand tools to complete the trail work (axes, shovels, cross-cut saws and other items) so the lighter loads were even more welcomed. The crew members not only appreciated the help, they seemed to enjoy watching the goats perform as only goats can do, including crossing a creek. Once we were all at camp, we pitched our tent and high-lined the goats a little ways apart from the crew, again to avoid any unwanted interactions, but hung out with everyone during "social hour." We hiked out the next day, while the crew continued to clear the trail for the next 4 days.



I highly encourage NAPgA members to look for opportunities to volunteer with their goats in their local areas. Helping to keep trails open on Public Lands is a rewarding experience. It's also a great way to build relationships with organizations and land management agencies, as well as share the joys of goat packing with folks that don't often get to see and work with the Pack Goat Community.

How do you keep your water troughs clean? Is algae an issue for you?

I have a 50 gallon water trough for my 5 goats. I clean and refill it as needed. We get pretty hot during the summer and the trough is in full sun much of the day.

I would pour Clorox into the tank and let it set to kill the algae while I took the goats out to browse. When we came back I'd empty the trough, spray it clean and then refill it with water, adding some Clorox to keep algae growth at bay. The Clorox helped for a couple of days then the algae would begin to grow.
